She entertained her listeners by reading excerpts from her books and by answering the questions that she is most frequently asked by her audiences. As for where she gets her ideas for her books, Ms. Letts said that her books are a blend of her real-life experiences as a midwife and her imagination.

Franklin & Marshall College professor David Schuyler gave a fascinating talk on the history of downtown Lancaster. In his presentation, Mr. Schuyler spoke about how Park City Mall and the rise of the suburbs transformed the landscape of the city. He also discussed the attempts at revitalizing the downtown area, highlighting his lecture with many slides of Lancaster in the early 1900s.

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
Dinner, a Book, and a Movie: Mezzanine Mavens hold dinner/movie meeting


The Mavens are always looking for hungry, new readers to join the club.

Library Staff receives EBSCO training

At the end of last year, the Stevens campus had the opportunity to evaluate EBSCOhost (the magazine/journal/periodical database) during a 3 - month trial period. In addition to being a better value for the library, the staff ultimately decided that EBSCOhost was more user-friendly and provided more appropriate resources for the college community.

Once the final decision was made to switch vendors, Mr. David Brisendine, a customer service representative, scheduled the LRC staff for in-house training. This informal training session, held on President's Day in the LRC's computer lab, helped the staff begin to familiarize themselves with the new database.

Sacred Heart Students Create Thaddeus Stevens Exhibit

Three students from the Sacred Heart School recently used the library's archives, under the guidance of Tim Creamer, for a school project they were working on. The students put together an exhibit on Thaddeus Stevens for a National History Day competition and used archival information in their research. Titled "Thaddeus Stevens: Savior of Free Public Education," their exhibit did so well at the local level that it earned them the right to compete at the regional level. The regional competition was held at Penn Manor High School, where the students earned third place in the Junior Group Exhibit category. They now move on to the state competition at Penn State University in May.

"Magazines, Journals, Periodicals." Clicking on EBSCO will bring you to a page that looks like Figure 1.

Next, click on EBSCOhost Web.





Figure 2—A partial list of databases in EBSCOhost

Click on Visual Search in the tabs at the top of the page.




Circles represent categories. Squares represent links to articles.

Elder Wisdom Circle is the name given to a group of volunteer seniors who provide practical advice and guidance to anyone who requests it. It's "Dear Abby" but with a twist since the pool of volunteers that make up the

Elder Wisdom Circle are all at least 60 years of age. It's this "richly diverse patchwork of life experience and wisdom" that qualifies the elders to dispense their advice - that AND successfully completing a screening process for attributes such as empathy and openmindedness. While the Elder Wisdom Circle does not provide legal, medical, or financial advice, it does offer more than just answers to relationship problems. Although relationship problems account for roughly 75% of the letters, other categories on the submission request form include career, garden,



home, and self-improvement. That explains why, if you find yourself browsing recent letters, you'll discover a wide spectrum of topics ranging from "sneaker odor" to "cat advice" to "searching for birth father." And when you read the responses, chances are you'll be struck by how wise the advice from the Elder Wisdom Circle actually sounds.
