

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

New Longer Hours for LRC





Featured Web Site - Search Engine Watch http://www.searchenginewatch.com

Search Engine Watch is the Web site created by Danny Sullivan, an Internet consultant and journalist. Begun as a research project in 1995, the site has emerged as the number one source of quality information on

search engines and search engine news. The Internet is still an everchanging landscape; new search engines use different technologies to index the Web while other search engines lose popularity and are left by the wayside. Search Engine Watch keeps track of all the changes taking place in your computer so that you can take advantage of them and perform better searches.

In addition to reporting on what's new, Sullivan et. al. offer tips to search engine users on how to search better. Web masters and site owners would be particularly interested in the sections on how search engines

rank pages in terms of relevancy. Both search engine users and web masters can keep up with industry developments by subscribing to the free newsletters – either Search Day, a daily newsletter or The Search Engine Report, which is monthly. Another newsletter, The Search Engine Update, is twice-monthly and is available with a paid membership.
