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



When the students returned from winter break, they were able to browse the display set up for Martin Luther King day. This was the first year that the library exhibited materials in its collection as a tribute to the civil rights leader. There were several books, videotapes, and dvds; some were autobiographical, some centered on the assassination of Dr. King, and several featured the speeches that he was so well known for. A copy of his famous "I Have a Dream Speech" was displayed in the center for all to read.

March is Women's History Month and the theme for 2014 is "women of character, courage, and commitment." The following is a preview of some profiles of women who can definitely be described as courageous and whose biographies will be on display next month.

Malala Yousafzai - I Am Malala

This is the story of the girl who stood up for education and was shot by the Taliban. She was 15 when, living in Pakistan, Malala was shot in the head on the bus ride home from school. Her survival and recovery were nothing short of a miracle and Malala went on to become a spokesperson for universal education and the youngest nominee ever for the Nobel Peace Prize.

Jody Williams - My Name is Jody Williams

Demonstrating commitment to freedom, selfdetermination, and human rights, Jody Williams is the third American woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize - for her work to ban landmines.

Rebecca Musser - The Witness Wore Red

After Rebecca Musser's polygamous marriage ended when she became widowed, Warren Jeffs, a leader in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, threatened her with remarriage. Instead, Rebecca engineered a daring escape and eventually testified in court against the church's leader resulting in a life sentence for Jeffs.

Abby Sunderland - Unsinkable

In 2010, when Abby Sunderland was just 16 years old, she attempted to become the youngest person to sail solo, nonstop, and unassisted around the world. This is the story of how she challenged herself and tested her limits out on the open sea. Her journey ended when a rogue wave rolled her sailboat and she had to be rescued in a remote area of the Indian Ocean.

Nujood Ali—I Am Nujood, Age 10 and Divorced

Nujood Ali was the first child bride in Yemen to win a divorce. Her courage to defy Yemini customs has inspired other young girls in the Middle East to challenge their marriages.

Suraya Sadeed—Forbidden Lessons in a Kabul Guesthouse

Sadeed was born in Afghanistan, the daughter of the governor of Kabul. Although she fled the country in the aftermath of the Soviet invasion in 1979, she eventually returned to her homeland to build clinics there, create secret schools, and bring hope to Afghan orphans and refugees.

Ayaan Hirsi Ali—Infidel

Infidel traces the author's journey through four unstable countries—Mogadishu, Saudi Arabia, Ethiopia, and Kenya in a desperate flight to escape an arranged marriage.
