

this past summer, the 6th Annual Lancaster Lock Show was an international show for collectors of antique and collectible padlocks, railroadiana, restraints, keys, door hardware, and more. Dr. Nye represented Thaddeus Stevens College when he attended the event this past summer. 
There are also chapters in the book devoted to Victorian lock mechanisms and evaluating a lock's condition.


Know Your Student Workers





Smart Brief's editors select and organize top stories from more than 10,000 news sources and then summarize them for their readers; their motto: "We read everything. You get what matters."

Editors at Smart Brief offer analysis of daily headlines in a variety of fields including Business, Education, Finance, Healthcare, Tech, and Retail. You can access this information either online via the website or by creating a customized newsfeed using the site's mobile apps. A third option is to sign up for one or more of the human-created newsletters delivered straight to your email inbox.

Click on the About link and then on Leadership to find out who created Smart Brief and who some of the people in key positions are now. Rick Stamberger, President and CEO of Smart Brief, is one of the founders of the company, which launched in 1999. In addition to serving as a White House Fellow in 1984-1985, Stamberger has been a board member of numerous nonprofit organizations. He is a graduate of Williams College and the Harvard Business School.

A recent look at the web site found these headlines in Education: "How to Use Projects to Teach Financial Literacy" and "Yale U. President Promises to Increase Diversity on Campus." And under Leadership in Business, these stories, "How to Build a Better Workplace" and "What Makes a Leader Trustworthy." And in contrast to much of the web, Smart Brief has a clean, streamlined look to its site that is noticeably ad-free. You won't get a lot of fluff at Smart Brief, just news stories that are "top editor picks, summarized for you."
